

From Fr Anthony

The following is taken from the Sixth Treatise (adapted) of Bishop Baldwin of Canterbury

The Word of God is something alive and active: it cuts like any double-edged sword but more finely. These words tell us how much power and wisdom there is in the Word of God for those who seek Christ, who is the Word and the Power and the Wisdom of God. This Word, with the Father from the beginning and co-eternal with him, came at its own chosen time, was revealed to them (from the ancient fathers to Christ's own apostles and disciples), was proclaimed by them, and was humbly received in faith by its believers. A Word, therefore, in the Father; a Word in the mouth; and a Word in the heart.

This Word of God is alive. The Father gave him life coming from himself, just as the Father's own life comes from his own self. The Word is not just alive, therefore, he is life, as he said: I am the way, the truth, and the life. Since the Word is alive to give life. For as the Father raises the dead



and gives them life, so the Son gives life to anyone he chooses. He gives life, as when he calls the dead man out of the tomb, saying Lazarus, come forth.

When this Word is preached, the voice of its preaching which is heard outwardly calls forth a voice of power that is heard inwardly, that voice by which the dead are restored to life and their praise raises up sons for Abraham. So this Word is alive in the heart of the Father, alive in the mouth of the preacher, and alive in the hearts of those who believe and love. If the Word is alive in this way, how can it not also be active?

The Word is active in creating, active in guiding the world, active in redeeming the world. What could be more active? What could be more powerful? Who shall tell of his powerful deeds? Who shall proclaim the praises of the Lord? He is active when it works, he is active when it is preached. For he does not come back emptyhanded: wherever it is sent, it prospers.

The Word is active and cuts finer than a double-edged sword when it is believed and loved. For what is impossible to the believer? What is hard for the lover? When this Word speaks, his words transfix the heart like a flight of sharp arrows, like nails hammered deep into its very essence. This Word is sharper than a double-edged sword in that it cuts deeper than any strength or power, it is finer than anything made by human ingenuity, sharper than human wisdom or learned speech.

GOD OF SURPRISES

Beginning to Dig for the Treasure

...Listen to Christ as he describes the parable of the Two Lost Sons, God's attitude to sinners, the God who at the moment, holds me in being, who feels more for me than I can possibly feel for him, or for anyone. The mystic, St. Catherine of Genoa, once said, 'God seems to have nothing else to do than to unite himself to us,' and an even more surprising statement, 'It seems to me that God has no other business than myself'!

As Christ tells the story of the two sons, use your imagination on the story so that you see the younger son leaving his father's house with his inheritance. Talk with him as he travels abroad, of his hopes and expectations, see his initial delight until the money runs out, his friends disappear and he is sitting in the



pig-sty. He is a symbol of all of us who have used our inheritance, our minds and bodies, to ensure that as much of creation as possible should praise, reverence and serve us. Contemplating him in the pig-sty can put us in touch with our own inner emptiness.

The prodigal decides to return home not from any high and honourable motive, but simply because he is hungry and desperate. This is a most consoling truth. His father is watching for him and rushes to meet him, not because the son is virtuous, nor because his motives are pure, but simply because he is his son and has returned home. All that we have to do is to admit our own emptiness to God and he rushes out to meet us. Linger on this truth because it is letting God be God to us, whereas our tendency is to want to put ourselves in order before we meet him, to be more conscious of our guilt than of his goodness. As you watch the encounter between father and son, beg to know that this truth is happening in you, that you are embraced and kissed by the father who delights in you. Let this truth break in on your unbelief and speak to the father from your heart with the simplicity of a child.

When you are ready to move on, go out and meet the elder son, coming home from work in the fields and talk with him. Watch his reaction to the sounds of music and dancing coming from the house and hear what he has to say when the servant tells him the reason for the celebration. He is so angry and bitter that when his father comes out to persuade him to enter and join the feast, he disowns both his father and brother saying, 'You, and that son of yours'. Try to feel the indignation and bitterness of the elder brother for we may discover that it resonates with hidden anger and bitterness in our own hearts. The elder brother is so conscious of his own hard work and dutiful service that he despises anyone that does not match up to him, and he resents any leniency being shown to weaker and less conscientious people.....

The Word: Year B, Ordinary Time, Sunday 25: Commentary on the Readings

Gospel: Mark 9:30-37

Mark gives us three formal prophecies of the Passion, of which this is the second. He uses the triple number frequently to stress the importance and sureness of an event. So Peter denies Jesus three times, and Pilate three times asserts Jesus' innocence. Jesus is shown to be fully aware of the fate that awaits him: he goes into it with his eyes open, and accepts his Father's will; he is, moreover, aware that his Father will not desert him, but will vindicate him by the Resurrection. Again the disciples fail to understand the message: while Jesus had been giving them the message of triumph only through suffering and humiliation, they had been thinking about who would be the greatest. So Jesus sets before them a child as the model. In what way is a child a model? Like adults, children can be selfish and they can be devious and scheming from an early age. However, children are probably more aware than adults that they cannot totally control a situation and trustingly accept that they are dependent on others. The final words that Jesus speaks in today's Gospel suggests that it is this quality of dependence that Jesus proposes: like little children we should be dependent on the will of the Father.

First Reading: Wisdom 2:12,17-20

This is one of the few readings we hear on Sundays taken from the Book of Wisdom. This book was written probably at Alexandria, and was written in Greek, so is not included in the Protestant canon of scripture, which includes only the books written in Hebrew. A major theme of the book is the contrast between divine Wisdom and folly. It also includes a wonderful poem to God's Wisdom, by which he created the world, 'the reflection of the eternal light, and the image of his goodness'. In today's reading we are presented with the taunts which those who refuse divine Wisdom make against those who embrace Wisdom. It is remarkable that in Matthew's gospel the taunts of the chief priests, scribes and

elders against Jesus as he hangs on the cross use these very same words. This use of scripture is typical of Matthew's irony, and shows just how wrong those taunting Jesus were. The reading, therefore, both prepares us for the prophecy of the passion in the first part of today's gospel reading, and contrasts the boasts of the godless with the wisdom of simplicity represented by the child in the second part of the gospel.

Second Reading: James 3:16-4:3

The reading from the Letter of James begins by contrasting quarrelling and ambition, and their evil effects, with the true wisdom which brings peace. Then it goes on to some stern words about prayer which is not answered, 'because you have prayed for something to indulge your own desires'. Is it wrong, then, to ask God for what we want? What about 'Ask and you shall receive: seek and you shall find? The problem of unanswered prayers of petition is a difficult one. We do not really believe that we can change God's mind and intentions by praying. Nevertheless, we express to God our needs and desires, although we are well aware that he knows them already. This is what a child does to a loving father, 'Please, please!' We even link arms with our mother, Mary, or even our brother and Saviour, Jesus, to increase the persuasive power. But every prayer of petition, just as a child's prayer to a loving father, contains the hidden text that the Father knows best. The child or the praying Christian can want something desperately, but, for true prayer, the child or Christian submits in obedience to the Father; only in this way is our prayer an expression of trust and affection.
